Dolores F. Shott, 76, of Annville, died Tuesday, April 17, 2018 at Masonic Village, Elizabethtown. She was the wife of Thomas F. Shott, celebrating their 15th anniversary on April 5th.

Born in Lebanon on January 31, 1942, she was the daughter of the late Robert C. and Ethel M. (Siegrist) Artz. Dolores graduated from Lebanon High School with the class of 1959 and worked as a medical secretary at the Hershey Medical Center and Philhaven. She was a member of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, where she actively participated as an Elder and Deacon. She was past president and lieutenant governor of the Annville-Cleona Kiwanis Club, a member of Travelers Protective Association, enjoyed riding her horse George, playing cards, traveling with her husband to Kiwanis and train conventions, and visiting New York City. Monthly lunch outings with her girlfriends were so important to Dolores, she enjoyed spending time with her family and her granddaughters were the light of her life.
