



## Roy B. Lucy

July 2, 1918 - December 31, 2012

Roy B. Lucy, Jr., of Hummelstown, PA., and lately in residence at the Lebanon Valley Brethren Home of Palmyra, PA., died Monday, December 31, 2012 of natural causes. He was 94 years old, having lived a long and full life. He is survived by two daughters, Melissa Dicker of Gainesville, VA, and Jennifer Steigelman of Harrisburg, PA., and a son, John A. Lucy of Los Angeles, CA. He was preceded in death by his loving wife, Frances T. Lucy, member of the Thomas family of Annville, PA, and daughter of Della M. Herr Thomas. He will be laid to rest with her at the Indiantown Gap National Veterans Cemetery, Annville, PA. Services at Kreamer Funeral Home & Crematory 618 E. Main St. Annville, PA 17003 are scheduled for Saturday, January 5th, at 2 pm. Born in Baltimore, MD. to Roy B. Lucy, Sr. and Marian Lucy, he was raised in Richmond, VA, where he achieved the rank of Captain of his Cadet Corps at John Marshall High School. He enlisted in the United States Navy in 1942, serving his country in the South Pacific during World War II until honorably discharged in 1945. His service in the Pacific Theater was detailed by his daughter Melissa in 2004, in a book entitled, "Roy B. Lucy, Jr. World War II In His Own Words". Married in 1948 to Harriet Oaks Lucy until her death in 1958, he found love again with Frances. He pursued a career in publishing, first with the Curtis Publishing Company "Saturday Evening Post" and "Holiday" magazines, then advancing into the advertising department of the Hearst Corporation "Cosmopolitan" magazine, retiring in 1988. His former places of residence included Westfield, NJ., and Radnor, PA. He enjoyed his family and

was proud of his family's long history in this country, with ancestors dating back to the second settlement of Jamestown, VA. He was a loving father, son, brother, and uncle.
